Summer highlights include Richard Prince, a part-time Hamptons resident who will exhibit new works at Guild Hall, based on photographs of Jackson Pollock (Aug. 13 to Oct. 10). Tauba Auerbach will show at Glenn Horowitz Bookseller (Aug. 13 to Sept. 11).

And then there's Gloria Hole, a group show at the Fireplace Project featuring works by Terrence Koh, Agathe Snow, Aurel Schmidt, and Cindy Sherman, held in an old garage across the road from the Pollock-Krasner house in the Springs (May 27 to June 20). The opening party on Saturday promises to be a spectacle with pallid hipsters mingling with the Tory Burch set.
